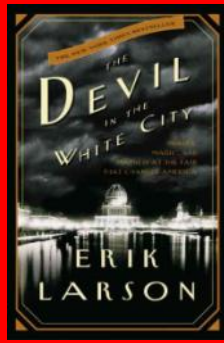

Roach has managed to write a book about cadavers that is as funny as it is informative. She investigates the plethora of routes a human body can take after death from military experiments to mulch.

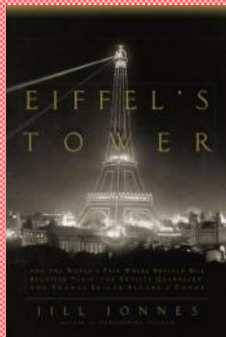
2. **[Sin in the Second City: Madams, Ministers, Playboys, and the Battle for America's Soul](#)**, by Karen Abbott

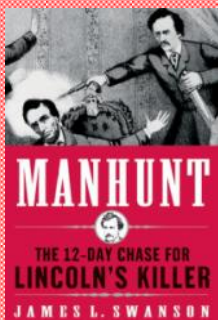
4. **[Loving Frank](#)**, by Nancy Horan

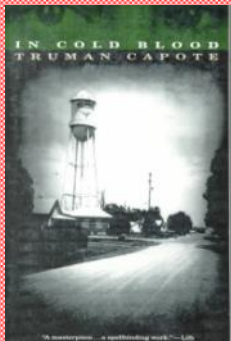

John Wilkes Booth planned and executed an assassination that would shock a nation. This fast-paced book, details how luck and skill help him elude law enforcement for twelve riveting days.



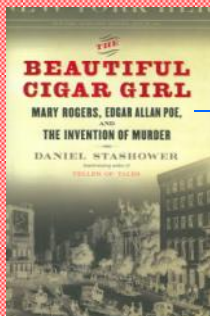
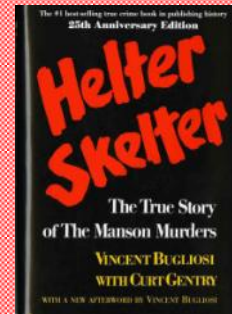


6. **[In Cold Blood](#)**, by Truman Capote

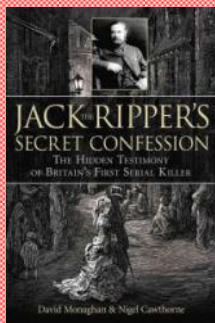
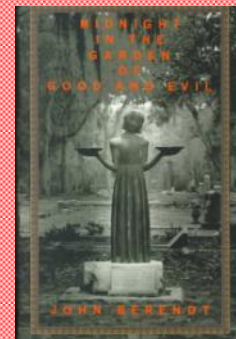


8. **[The Beautiful Cigar Girl: Mary Rodgers, Edgar Allan Poe, and the Invention of Murder](#)**, by Daniel Stashower

Mary Rogers was a cigar girl known in 1840's Manhattan for her incredible beauty. A year after her unsolved murder, Edgar Allan Poe took it upon himself to investigate the crime and write some of the earliest detective fiction.

9. **[Midnight In the Garden of Good and Evil](#)**, by John Berendt

Berendt smoothly balances this book between a depiction of 1980's Savannah socialite Jim Williams. This was also made into a 1998 movie featuring Kevin Spacey and John Cusack.



10. **[Jack the Ripper's Secret Confession](#)**, by David Monaghan
and Nigel Cawthorne

Monaghan and Cawthorne attempt to pinpoint the identity of Jack the Ripper by comparing case information to a memoir written by a man named "Walter". While engrossing, be prepared for unsettling graphic content.
