Long time readers know that I grew up going to my local branch of the Chicago Public Library every Saturday with my family. I rediscovered my love of reading when I started working at DPL. The staff continuously provide amazing book recommendations, and I've read books I never would have picked up. Here are some of the books that stuck with me in 2023.

- *Tom Lake* by Ann Patchett is a story about the little moments in life that make up a full and rich life. The audiobook is performed by Meryl Streep.
- *The Maid* by Nita Prose is a story about Molly, a 25 year old woman who struggles with social cues. She takes pride in her work as a maid but gets caught up with the wrong crowd and ends up being accused of murder! The story moves at a quick pace and reminds me of the board game Clue.

- I do enjoy a good thriller! This year, *Rock Paper Scissors* by Alice Feeney stood out for me. While neither of the main characters was particularly likable I appreciated the author's storytelling and found myself hooked. Alice Feeney draws a lot of her inspiration from Dame Agatha Christie.
- I also appreciate a celebrity memoir. Two that stuck out to me this year, Pamela Anderson's *Love, Pamela* and Paris Hilton's *Paris: The Memoir*. Both provided new insights on two famous blondes.
- My final recommendation is an oldie but a goodie, *A Man Called Ove* by Frederik Backman. It's a delightful story about a widower who only wants to die but life keeps getting in his way. Backman's characters are so real and sympathetic.


What is Deerfield READING?

My husband and I traveled to Portugal this summer to celebrate twenty years together. While he was (deep) sleeping on the long flight home, I was reading one book the entire ride without




stopping ... and months later, I'm still thinking about it. Original, bold, and brilliant, Danielle Trussoni's gripping thriller The Puzzle Master is about an expert puzzle master who finds himself embroiled in an ancient mystery. The author's awe-inspiring research alone gave me the best kind of goosebumps. This utterly absorbing novel is a little bit of everything: part The Da Vinci Code, part Friday Night Lights, part love story, philosophical, historical, sensual, supernatural, a little terrifying, with a strong spoonful of Jewish mysticism – Kabbalah. Can our hero save the girl with mind games? This book goes BIG, the writing is gorgeous, and I inhaled every word.

And There was Light by Jon Meacham is a terrific biography of Abraham Lincoln. It explains his thoughts on the issues of slavery and how the status of African Americans changed during the course of the war, right up to the Union victory. It's a wonderful portrayal of President Lincoln's leadership in a democracy guided by practicality and morality. Lincoln's politics of compromise and faith would serve us well today. Jon Meacham is a well known historian and although this is a long book, it is very informative and well written. We all know about President Lincoln but Meachum brings in some of President Lincoln's core beliefs, religion, and very difficult and challenging upbringing, for us to better understand

the foundation of his core principles against slavery, the importance of keeping the nation united, and the horrors of the civil war. Perhaps intentionally or unintentionally, Meacham finds several



parallels of President Lincoln's tenure with today's divisive political climate.

Hi reader! I am thrilled to share with you my favorite book, *Jane Eyre* by Charlotte Bronte. *Jane Eyre* follows the life of a young orphan in Victorian-era England, who after living with



her cruel aunt, is sent to live in a boarding school. From there, her life transforms, and we begin to see the spirited, intelligent, and humble Jane that emerges as she enters adulthood. Throughout her life, she endures love and heartbreak, tragedy and joy, all through her struggles as a poor woman in a rigid social order. The book is not only engaging in its many twists and turns, but it also inspires the reader to be grateful and true to themselves. Although the text can be challenging at times in terms of the vocabulary used, it is also enriching and rewarding. I enjoyed reading this book and hope that you will too!



One favorite audiobook experience this year was Dinners with Ruth, written and read by the author, Nina Totenberg. Nina's NPR reports on the Supreme Court count among my





favorite radio moments, and Nina is at her best in this book as she describes through dozens of anecdotes her lifelong friendship with Ruth and Marty Ginsburg. At times poignant, it's also memorable and astute, like everything Nina ever did.

The other book I listened to recently was written and read by a different smart and insightful journalist, Amanda Ripley. High Conflict is another book best listened to as she utilizes a good deal of original research audio. Her work is as applicable in home/ familial settings as it is in one's professional life. This is because just like individuals, organizations can find themselves in protracted and intractable conflicts with participants often wondering how things became such a mess.

As a senior myself, when I read that 83 year old Annie Ernaux won a Nobel prize in Literature in 2022, I wanted to read her work. I dipped into three of her books: A Girl's Story, A Woman's Story, and The Years.



She does an amazing literary trick. She not only fictionalizes her life story but tells it in a simple straightforward style, all the while examining what she is thinking as she relates the events, At times she is brutally frank; at times prosaic. These stories may not be everyone's "cup of tea" though the books are short.

When I saw the movie Oppenheimer, I could not hear all the dialogue, but was so intrigued that I read the book, a long one: American Prometheus: Triumph & Tragedy of J. Robert Oppenheimer by Kai Bird & Martin J. Sherwin. Got it on Libby. A fascinating Pulitzer Prize winner, the story

of Oppenheimer's brilliant, charismatic life glued me to my chair with many insights into his curiosity, commitment and humility. I learned maybe more than I wished to know about events through WWII and the Cold War.



which are written by Jocko Willink and Leif Babin. These books encourage readers to adopt "extreme ownership" of their personal and professional lives. The text illustrates the skills required to become more effective leaders through taking responsibility for one's performance and that of their teams. Additionally, the authors utilize their experiences leading Navy Seals in war zones to demonstrate how leaders can prepare for success. Although leading Navy Seals in an international setting may present differences compared to working in a local government, the principles conveyed by the authors are still highly applicable. I strongly recommend both of these books to any manager seeking to enhance their leadership abilities.


